

#### Advocacy

Advocacy has been the foundation of Jcycn even before its inception through Jagriti child club. At present, Jcycn has raised its voice not only at national but also international level through dozens of networks around the world as an one of the active members while Jcycn provides its leadership support for the same in NCFLG Forum, NCGR and SPCSN.

Jcycn has been leading the national level of advocacy for the child friendly local government. For this, Jcycn is the secretariat to National Child Friendly Local Governance (NCFLG) Forum composed of 15 member organizations raising voices together for the children. Consequently, over 40 local levels of the government have been declared of having child friendly local governance practices.





In our two decades of experience, we have a clear understanding that while advocating for the children, girls should be given special preference due to the gender based taboos of Nepal's male domina ting society. Jeyen took the lead to unite voices of 42 member organizations representing all seven provinces for the cause. And hence, National Coalition for Girls Child Rights (NCGR) Nepal was founded in 2019. Today the coalition monitors, protects and promotes girls' child rights through various national and international human rights mechanisms.

We have not only limited our advocacy work for the children only, but for the working age population, access to health, and the older population as well. For this, we have been chaired the main network composed of more than 20 I/NGOs and 19 thematic networks since last three years.




#### Some of our actions related to advocacy





Rasuwa is one of the worst affected districts by the Earthquake in 2015 and one of the toughest geographical locations. More than 80% of people in Rasuwa is believed to have been affected by the earthquake. Karumarang, the project location, was no exception. The village was severely affected by the impacts of the earthquake with it losing a fair share of its infrastructures such as

schools and irrigation systems and also the people's means of survival, their livelihoods. Responding to the situation, Jcycn delivered following reovery efforts:

- Construction of a school building
- Cash for work programming
- Agricultural input supports
- Strengthening a local cooperative
- Social discussion and women empowerment







# A transformative form of the school infrastructures














The project also created short term employment for at least 177 locals including 44 women up to 35 days each.

As the byproduct of the project, at least 35 local business keepers also got financially benefited by supplying construction material thus making the local economy mobilized.

A cooperative which was in a dormant situation due to the earthquake has been rejuvenated under which at least 250 locals are re-organizing themselves and conducting social and financial interactions. In addition, 157 villagers are trained in agriculture with the provision of various input supports. Therefore, the livelihood of the village has been restored.

We have been working to expand people's access to choices of a safer and dignified working environment. This is only possible when a vibrant, strong, and influential community help themselves to prevents unsafe migration. Therefore, our actions have been focused on:

- 1. Improving knowledge and capacities of the potential migrants, migrant workers, returnees and their families.
- 2. Making children and youths aware of unsafe migration and motivating them to pursue education and other forms of personal development.
- 3. Strengthening capacity of local institutions on promoting safer migration and reintegration of the returnees.












# With the safer migration project, we have reached,

192 out-going migrant workers with pre-departure orientation
139 smallholder farmers with agro-based input support
450 families covered with the outreach programme
2100 people with the awareness activities
208 families with counselling services
308 young people with the career counselling
151 active population with the vocational training
26 local stakeholders with the psychosocial counselling
28 local leaders with the social dialogue for safer migration
178 school children with the coaching class and extra curriculum activities





To empower indigenous marginalized women through improving status in livelihood and gender-based violence, 40 men and women from 35 families are being supported throughout the project cycle with the delivery of knowledge and material support for:

Soil test and its treatment

Cow dung and urine management

Nursery management

Techniques and management of poly house cultivation

Integrated pest management techniques

Commercial flower farming

Training on leadership, team building and gender equality

### School Support and Child Nutrition Improving Programme

(Sunsari)

Dipendra school was established 17 years before in the slum area in the town of Dharan. The children at Dipendra are from socially excluded, economically poor Dalits. The community that the school serves has around 450 families, who make their living by collecting firewood and doing casual labor work in the nearby market place.

The school receives no financial support from the government except a partial salary for some teachers—and non-teaching staff. The students at Dipendra outnumbered the teachers. To support running the school, we have been financing partial teachers' salaries, capacity building, small—school infrastructure, mid-day meals, uniforms, and stationeries to name a few.







#### **Response and Recovery**

(Makwanpur, Nawalparasi, Rasuwa, Sunsari)



Jeyen had been responding COVID-19 with the emergency fo od and medical relief packages after the first wave, followed by the recovery efforts until the second wave appeared. 




In the Community Outreach events conducted by the peer educators, they have reached 539 people in the first year, 493 people in the second year and 47 people in the third year.







### People Reached through Events/day celebration

The children we work for can be supported various ways. To ensure them not to deprive from any of their basic rights, the family are being supported to enhance their regular income through livestock supports.

We have so far, supported 90 families with two goat each.




